8. Compare how two or more books tell the same U.S. history event side by side.
9. Create a virtual walk-through of landmarks tied to one theme in U.S. history.
10. Research and present how one invention or new idea changed life in America.
11. Write short bios of diverse people from one era, with key facts and pictures.
12. Make a board game that teaches players about life in a chosen U.S. history period.
13. Design campaign posters, flyers, and buttons for an old presidential race using the real platforms.
14. Pretend historical figures had social media today—plan posts, tweets, and images.
